SOME COMMON QUESTIONS ABOUT THE WALK:

WILL I SEE ALL THE PRESENTATIONS?

YES! After a brief "hello" to all at 2:00 PM, everyone splits into groups – one group per grave site. At the end of the presentation, the group will move TOGETHER to the next site, then to the next and so on until each group has heard all the presentations.

WHAT CAN I EXPECT TO AT EACH GRAVE SITE?

At the site, a person (often a relative) will be dressed in period clothing and tell the story of the deceased. Typically props and pictures are also included in each presentation. We also make a few chairs available or you are free to bring your own.

HOW LONG IS THE EVENT?

With five speakers speaking for approximately 10-15 minutes each (along with socializing and brief instructions), this event typically lasts around 2 hours.

WHAT ELSE?

- This is a FREE event; although, we will accept donations from those who wish to do so.
- We have light refreshments available at the conclusion.

SCHAFERS TO MRS. SCHAFERS

What do you remember most about Schafer's Tavern? Was it the juicy hamburgers and American fries prepared by either Don or Steve?

For me and many others it was the large beer-bottle shaped cooler. I remember my dad getting me an orange Nehi pop from that cooler in the late 40s or early 50s. The cooler has a very interesting history. Don remembers his dad getting the cooler around 1931-32. Prohibition ended in 1933, so it was probably about that time. The Jewett Refrigerator company made two sizes: the Beerador, which held 22 cases and the Bevador, which held 11 cases. Schafers has the Beerador. The price in 1939 was \$595.00 for the Beerador, which at that time was a good chunk of money.

Jewett Refrigerator company started in 1849 as a maker of ice boxes. By the 1910s and 20s it was an early pioneer of premium electric refrigeration and stayed in business until the 1960s. In the later years it was known as a maker of blood bank storage refrigeration units. It is a fun company to look up on Google.

Teresa Murray, the current owner of the now Ms. Schafer's, has taken great pride in getting it up and going again after it sitting in the back not working for many years. Through some generous donations and the handiwork of Pete Nurenberg, it is now functioning again as in its heyday. One of the interesting things is that the refrigerator compressor unit is in the basement and refrigeration lines are piped up through the floor to the cooler. Compressor units were much larger back then compared to the much smaller compact units today. The glass in the door was replaced, the bottom was replaced. The rollers, on which the rotating shelves sit, were soaked in Coca Cola to remove the rust and now work as they did when new. The one remaining thing she still would like to do is fix the original neon lights if she can get the parts and find somebody that knows how to fix them. It now has LED lights in it. As far as the outside, she fully intends to keep it in its original color. It was never painted the color of a beer bottle. Thanks Teresa for keeping some of our local history alive.
