More Genealogy Material



He emigrated to America in 1841 with his parents, Adam and Katherine (Muller) Vidua/Fedewa and settled in Westphalia. He married Helena Firmerich on May 13, 1851. Johann died February 17, 1901. Both Johann and Helena are buried in St. Mary's Cemetery.
